

FIRST ANNUAL BOUNDARY COUNTY FAIR IS GRAND SUCCESS

Wonderful Exhibits of Fruit, Grain, Grasses, Vegetables, Cooking, Needlework, Etc. Were Shown To Several Thousand Fair Visitors the Past Week--Prizes Awarded by Judges Friday Morning.

Expenses Paid From Receipts--Stock Money to Be Used for Permanent Grounds and Buildings--"Kootenai Stamped" Show Attracted Large Crowds--Fair Officials Well Pleas'd with Support Given New Association and Promise Larger and Better Display Next Year.

The first annual fair of the Boundary County Fair Association, held on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, of last week, was successful far in excess of expectations in attendance, in the number and quality of exhibits and in financial way.

Several thousand people visited the fair and to every one the displays were a revelation--no one realized the county could produce such an abundance of fruit, vegetables, grains and other products.

A. Shultis, the treasurer of the association, states that he believes a great deal of money was received from donations and concessions to cover the entire expenses of the fair. The fair officials and the stockholders are to be congratulated that it was able to put over the fair this year without going into debt and without having to use a single cent of stock money. The sale of stock progressed through the three days of the fair and nearly \$1500 worth was sold. All stock money is to be used for permanent grounds and buildings.

W. O. Rosebaugh hopes to take care of any mistakes that may have been made to the entire satisfaction of all exhibitors and all complaints will receive careful consideration and adjustment.

The Bonners Ferry public school exhibit at the fair occupied a large space and helped materially in attracting visitors. The exhibit consisted of displays of handsome cabinets, chairs, etc., made by the boys of the manual training department; also all kinds of plain and fancy needlework made by students in the domestic arts department, and a display of art work done by the pupils of the various grades. The exhibit was highly complimented by everyone and it was generally conceded that there is not another town of the size of Bonners Ferry in the western states that can show as good an exhibit from its schools.

The exhibition drills by the members of Prof. Campbell's military training class, were held each afternoon and attracted large crowds. Friday afternoon the company was turned over to various officers in competition.

R. A. HATCHETT BURIED SUNDAY

Deceased Saturday of Peritonitis--Buried in Moravia Cemetery.

Rufus Aubrey Hatchett died at the Bonners Ferry hospital Saturday of peritonitis. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Moravia schoolhouse. Interment was had at the Moravia cemetery.

The funeral was attended by a large company of the friends of the deceased and his family, many of whom were members of the Masonic lodge, of which the deceased was a member. The services were conducted by Rev. E. R. Henderson, assisted by Rev. A. H. Morton. The members of the Methodist church choir rendered several selections and H. Durose sang a solo. The pallbearers were O. C. Wilson, J. R. Meeker, C. D. Simonds, C. W. King, E. L. Little and J. Bert Cowen.

The deceased was born in Texas on July 12, 1884. He was a railway bridge carpenter by trade and came to this district some 16 years ago, later acquiring a farm in the Moravia district. He was married to Miss Teresa Simmons on December 10, 1913. He is survived by his wife and four children: Louis, age 5 years; Lawrence, aged 3 years; Myrvin, aged 2 years; and a six day old infant. His father and mother, five brothers and three sisters reside in Arkansas.

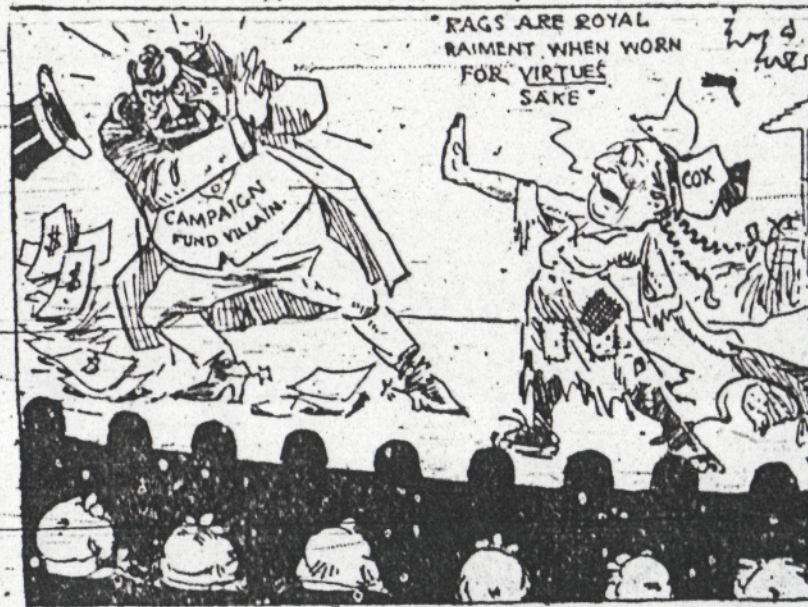
