Dad and mom planted a large orchard and as always, he had his bees. In his later years, Laurence spent hours weeding and hoeing in the garden and caring for his strawberry patch.

Dad didn't ask much from life, but felt he needed to give to others. His lack of concern for his own physical comfort and his joy in the simple things are examples we as his children and grandchildren can learn from.
