Mary Etta Jones was born in Laporte, Ind.,
September 25, 1838, and died in Spokane, Wash.
September 18, 1928, therefore lacking but a few
days of being 90 years of age. The body was
brought to Bonners Ferry today and graveside
services were onducted in Grandview cemetery,

The family removed from Iowa in 1885, settling in Kansas. Three years later they came to Idaho, locating at Bonners Ferry, where they continued to reside for many years. Mrs. Jones left here in 1921 when she moved to Spokane to
