## LOCAL CAMPING GROUP

Commercial Club Subscription May Provide Money.

The regular meeting of the Kootenai Valley Commercial club at Manx cafe Monday night was well attended, but brief. Several committees asked for more time to complete reports. John Hanson was chairman in the absence of President B. Bowell and J. B. Cowen was acting secretary in place of D. M. Palm.

The matter of raising funds for improving the tourist park kitchen and the installation of shower buildings at the park was taken up, but definite action was postponed pending the annual subscription for funds scheduled to take place this week. N. Brown, chairman of the tourist park committee, said that estimate on the work totaled \$520. Of this amount \$65 is the estimated cost of a boiler and heating plant for showers, the remainder being for remodeling the kitchen and building an addition for the baths.

Clipping of the streets and the installation of a radio broadcasting station in Bonners Ferry were held over until next week, by request of the committees acting on them.

Dr. E. E. Fry, chairman of the roads committee, stated that the county steam shovel, over which he had been remarks made at a previous meeting, with the result that an inquiry was asked for as to why it remained idle while an outside shovel was brought in at high rental, so that the county's machine was available for the road work, but it had been taken to the Klockner ranch and was now being used in diking work at that point.
