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Services Held For John O'Brien

Funeral service for John O'Brien, who died suddenly Sunday evening, were held Wednesday morning at nine o'clock from St. Ann's Catholfe church, Father Haegy officiating. Interment was in Grandview cemetery. The pallbearers were John Conway, Sr., Joe Rabdau, H. M. Macnamara, John Lynch, Emil Dion and Ernest Mayer.

John W. O'Brien was born April 22, 1883 at Wilson, Wis. He came to Bonners Ferry in 1911 and was associated with his brother-in-law, L. N. Brown, in the general store which they had purchased from the George R. Gray company. After a five-year partnership Mr. O'Brien sold his interest to Mr. Brown, the former moving to Chisholm, Minn, where he spent five or six years. He then returned west, locating at Astoria, Ore., where he resided a year or two and then returned to Bonners Ferry where he had since made his home.

Mr. O'Brien was married in April, 1914, to Rose Halliday at Sand-point, Idaho. Four children were born to them, all of whom survive. They are John and Daniel O'Brien, of River Falls, Wis., William O'Brien, of Bonners Ferry, and Miss Loretta O'Brien, of Seaside,

survivors include three Other sisters, Mrs. John J. Brown, River Falls, Wis., Mrs. W. C. Fewkes, Rexford, Mont., and Mrs. L. N. Brown, Bonners Ferry; one brother, Daniel O'Brien, Bonners Ferry; one half sister, Sister M. Ethel, O. S. B., Eau Claire, Wis., and two half brothers, Robert G. Cushing, of Colby, Wis., and Leonard F. Cushing, of Forest Lake, Minn.

About 12 years ago Mr. O'Brien was severely injured in an auto-mobile accident. While he regain-ed fair health, he never fully re-covered from the effects of the crash, and during recent years had suffered some from heart attacks and choking spells. Sunday eve-ning, while eating a meal in a local lunch room he was slezed with a severe coughing spell. Before medical aid could be reached he expired, presumably from a heart attack following the choking spell.
