He was born March 31, 1889 at Woodsville, Mich. He moved to Havre, Mont., at a very young age, where he did ranch work. In 1908 he moved to Bonners Ferry, where he farmed and did woods work. He entered the U. S. Army in October of 1917 serving until Dec. 28, 1918 when he received his honorable discharge. He again returned to Bonners Ferry and on August 12, 1921, he married Charlotte May Sweet here.

He was a member of the American Legion, Boundary Post No. 55. Survivors include a stepson, Stanley Sweet; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Thelma Clark of Moyie Springs, and Mrs. Ruby Hartz of Portland, several brothers and sisters in Michigan and several step grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Services were conducted Tuesday, Aug. 13 at the Hillcrest Memorial chapel at 11:00 a.m. with the Rev. W. B. Nelson officiating. Mrs. Arthur Campbell played the organ.

They were on their way toward Troy at the Yaak turnoff, taking out a huge section of concrete. They were out all night and through the day Wednesday repairing damage caused by the electrical storm.

It was also reported that the telephone company experienced some disturbance to their microwave system in the area.

The Deer Ridge and Hall Mountain Forest Service lookouts reported about 40 lightning strikes in the area. There were three fires reported from strikes in the West Mountain, Keno Creek and Meade Creek areas. There were four fires on the Bonners Ferry district Wednesday, all controlled. A crew was out Thursday on a "sleeper" fire on Dawson ridge.

Tillman Sandaker

Tillman N. Sandaker died Sept. 22 in the Community Hospital E.C.F. wing in Bonnors Ferry. Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Sept. 27 in the Trinity Lutheran Church with Rev. Dean Peterson officiating. Interment followed in the Grandview Cemetery. Military Rites were by American Legion Post No. 55.

Tillman was born July 1, 1892, in Ettrick, Wisc. to Lars and Anna Sandaker. He received his education in Hegg, Wisc. At 15 he came with his father to homestead in Commanche, Mont. At 17 he went to work for a lumber yard, piling lumber in Belmont, Mont. By 21 he was manager of a Christina, Mont. lumberyard. He entered the U.S. Army where he served as an infantryman.

During WW I he was shot in the hip which took several months to recuperate. When he returned home, the Monarch Lumber Company placed him as manager in Ryegate, Mont. He met and later married Hazel Hium Nov. 20, 1921, in Belmont, Mont.

A few years later he was moved

to Winnett, Mont. as a store manager store there until WW II. He then worked on the ration control board and draft board. After that Tillman ran a liquor store until he retired at the age of 72. Two of his children and their families had moved to Bonnors Ferry. In 1969 he and Hazel also moved here. He was active in the American Legion, WW I Veterans, and Disabled American Veterans. He was a member of the Odd Fellows and the Trinity Lutheran Church. Tillman entered the Community Hospital E.C.F. Wing in 1986 after having suffered a stroke.

Tillman is survived by two sons, Maurice Sandaker and Allen Sandaker both of Bonnors Ferry; two daughters, Pat Poulton of Bonnors Ferry and Marjorie Coon of Glendive, Mont.; one sister, Laura Sandaker and one brother, Howard Sandaker both of Billings, Mont.; 16 grandchildren, 29 great-grandchildren, and two great-great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his wife, Hazel; son, Gene; and grandson, Jimmy Coon.

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achine trade industry. The industry's average wage decreased, however, by \$1.22 cents an hour to an average wage of \$6.25 per hour.

Structural work and construction increased in the past several years with 56 more job openings and 20 additional applicants in the 1989-90 operating year. The industry had 179 applicants for 98 positions with an average wage of \$5.48 an hour, an increase of 59 cents.

In the transportation industry, there were 50 job openings, an increase of 28 openings, and 60 applicants, an increase of 23 applicants. The industry's average wage jump .02 an hour to \$5.76.

There were 126 job openings in the packaging and material handling industry in Boundary County compared with 87 openings previously. There were 137 applicants in 1989-90 compared with 116 applicants in 1986-87. The industry's average wage was \$6.05 in 1989-90 compared to \$4.89 in 1986-87.
