

Funeral Services Held Tuesday for George Waterloo

George Waterloo, 66, longtime Boundary county resident, passed away at Community hospital Friday evening, December 20th, following a lingering illness.

He was born November 27, 1902, at Sturgeon, Pa., the son of Emile and Leontine Decamp Waterloo. As a child he moved with his parents to Herrin, Ill., where he grew up and received his education. Following his education he worked as a miner and, on September 25, 1926, married Marcelle Hennette at Marion, Ill.

Following his marriage he made his home in Chicago, where he worked as an electrician until 1931 when he moved with his family to Boundary county and purchased a ranch at Naples, which he operated as well as being employed by the Bonners Ferry Lumber company.

During World War II he worked for the U. S. Government in the Immigration, and Naturalization Service, at Missoula and Santa Fe, N. Mex. He enjoyed hunting and fishing and being in the outdoors, and made his home on the ranch at Naples at the time of his death.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Marcelle Waterloo, at Naples; two sons George A. Waterloo of Lake Stevens, Wash., and Richard Waterloo, Naples; a daughter, Mrs. Louise E. Acker, Boise; also one grandchild.

Graveside rites were conducted Tuesday morning at Grandview cemetery, with Rev. Darrel Iwerks officiating. Interment, under the direction of Hillcrest Memorial chapel, followed in Grandview cemetery.
